


Holy Week comes to an end at sunset of Great and Holy Saturday, as the Church prepares to celebrate her most ancient and preeminent festival, Pascha, the feast of feasts.

The time of preparation will give way to a time of fulfillment. The glorious and resplendent light emanating from the empty Tomb will dispel the darkness. Christ, risen from the dead, cracks the fortress of death and takes "captivity captive" (Psalm 67:19).

All the limitations of our createdness are torn asunder. Death is swallowed up in victory and life is liberated. "For as by a man came death, by a man came also the resurrection of the dead. For as in Adam all die, so also in Christ shall all be made alive" (I Corinthians 15:21-22).

Pascha is the dawn of the new and unending day. The Resurrection constitutes the most radical and decisive deliverance of humankind.

FATHER'S MESSAGE

April 1, 2020

Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you; not as the world gives do I give to you. Let not your hearts be troubled, neither let them be afraid. . . I have said this to you, that in me you may have peace.

In the world you have tribulation; but be of good cheer, I have overcome the world."

(John 14:27 and 16:33)

Beloved Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Greetings in our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ, who suffered and died for our salvation! Once again this month, we will enter into that most solemn and sacred time of year: Holy Week, when we remember the passion of our Lord. All around us, the world is full of flux and change: the economy is great, then it is not. Stocks climb to the stratosphere, and then they plummet to their lowest point in years. International crises come and go. Governments rise and fall. One week we are healthy, and then the next we come face to face with a novel and deadly pathogen. One thing, however, does not change: the reality of the Cross, and of the Empty Tomb. This is the truth that anchors our life, that gives it meaning and purpose. This is the source of our faith, and the reason for our hope. Peace on this earth may be more illusive than dreams, but the Peace of God is ours for all eternity, if only we open our hearts and minds to it, and trust in our Savior that He will never abandon us, no matter what.

The services of Holy Week are a journey, that take us from the triumphant entry of our Lord into Jerusalem, through a time of vigil with the Bridegroom, to the Last Supper, the Betrayal, the Trial, the Crucifixion, and beyond. Through them, the Church invites us to enter with Jesus into the very mystery at the heart of our salvation: namely, that the Incarnate God gave His life, that we might live with Him forever in Paradise. As St. Gregory of Nazianzus put it:

"He lays down His life, but He has power to take it again; and the veil is rent, for the mysterious doors of heaven are opened. The rocks are cleft, the dead rise. . .. He dies, but He gives life, and by His death destroys death. He is buried, but He rises again. He goes down into Hell, but He brings up the souls."

(Oration 41)

For Orthodox Christians, the New Life in Christ is not something to be lived by us strictly as individuals, or even in the private company of our families. It is something to be experienced in the context of the entire community of faith which is the Church. This year, however, because of the Covid-19 pandemic, things will be different for all of us. At first, just the elderly, who are always the most vulnerable population in such circumstances, were told to stay home. Then, families with children – especially if they come into regular contact with older people. Now, *all of us* are expected to do so – unless we work for a "life-sustaining business." Fortunately, "religious organizations" have been included in this category. Nevertheless, this does not mean that we are free to go on with business as usual. As our hierarch and pastor of this Cathedral, Metropolitan Savas, has directed, we may, for the time being, celebrate the major services, but only with five persons present. This is in order to protect everyone from each other. You will be notified if you are among the five for any given service, and the door will be locked for safety reasons after that.

It is understandably hard for many of us to accept these restrictions. Some even question the validity of such policies, saying that it is not worth the damage to the economy that this enforced isolation is causing. "People die from the flu every year," they contend, "but we don't close down the whole country when it shows up in our community." True, but, consider: this bug is really contagious – far more contagious than the flu – and far more deadly! Every step to reduce social contact that has been imposed on us is totally appropriate and totally necessary.

FATHER'S MESSAGE, Con't

How, then, do we stay together as a family united by our faith, which makes us all brothers and sisters in Christ? How do we constitute the "Body of Christ" when we cannot gather as such in our Sanctuary? First, let us not forget that this is a mystical bond, forged at our baptism, which is strengthened over the years as we grow closer to Christ and to one another. This bond of love, this gift from above, exists and unites us, no matter where we are. It joins us as one family, with God as our Father. As the Apostle Paul writes, "When we cry, "Abba! Father!" it is the Spirit himself bearing witness with our spirit that we are children of God, and if children, then heirs, heirs of God and fellow heirs with Christ, provided we suffer with him in order that we may also be glorified with him" (Romans 8:15-17).

The challenge we face right now, when we are *all* suffering – whether because of the enforced isolation, or our anxieties about contracting the illness, or the loss of income from not being able to go to work – is to reaffirm that gift by looking after one other, even if from afar. Call or text, or group-chat on the internet, if you can, with your relatives and friends – and even with fellow parishioners who you may not be particularly close to. Who knows – perhaps a new friendship may be forged in the process! For our elders and those who have special needs: if you cannot or are not supposed to leave your house and need help with groceries, please call the Church Office, and we will match you with a volunteer who can help you with groceries and necessities.

If finances are a serious challenge for any of you, PLEASE let me know! The Agape Fund was created for times such as these. The Philoptochos also stands ready. Whether it is to pay a bill, buy some food, pay a utility, or any other necessity, your Church is ready to assist. Please do not hesitate out of embarrassment or shame! Confidentiality is a part of the package.

At the same time, we must also remember that the financial obligations of our parish – such as maintenance, utilities, salaries, security, etc. – do not cease, even during this unprecedented pandemic. Our usual source of income, such as Sunday offerings, cannot be counted on for the present. Most challenging of all, however, is the looming prospect that we may very well have to postpone our annual Food Festival until the fall because of the epidemic.

For those who can still afford it (considering how many have lost jobs and income because of the crisis), we respectfully ask you to continue supporting our beloved parish by mailing in your usual donations. For those who usually make your stewardship donation in one lump sum at the end of the year, please consider making the payment now, to help us out in this time of need. The Parish Council is also working on a new way to donate online. Detailed instruction of how to do this will be given, once the system is set up, and added to our webpage and Facebook. At that point, all of us can use it, if we wish, in order to establish a regular pattern of giving that splits up our pledge over time.

Our new camera in the Sanctuary should be functional by the time you read this. We will make every effort to "live stream" online our services with it – both on the Church website (stnickspgh.org) and on the Church's Facebook page. You can access it either way. So, we extend an invitation: even if by electronic means, you are welcome and encouraged to worship with us, and looking forward to Pascha, to celebrate the Light which knows no night, to be renewed in heart and soul; and to find the balm which heals and restores our souls: "The peace of God, which passes all understanding" (Philippians 4:9).

I encourage you to investigate them; they are ALL occasions for God's grace to bless us and comfort us in this difficult time. (In order to follow the links highlighted below, you must first access this newsletter online (see our website, stnickspgh.org), and go to page 5. Then, put your cursor over the underlined words in each case, but do not click the mouse. A box should pop up telling you "Ctrl + Click to follow" Press both the control button (ctrl) and the cursor -left- button on the mouse at the same time, and the website or document should appear.)

Several Monasteries are live streaming all of their services, including hours, matins, compline, vespers, Liturgies, etc. both mornings and evenings.

The Orthodox Monastery of the Transfiguration in Ellwood City, PA is livestreaming most of their services, you can access their schedule and livestream link <u>HERE</u>

The Hermitage of the Holy Cross in Wayne, WV is also livestreaming all of their services, link and schedule <u>HERE</u>

Here is a copy of the <u>Akathist to the Theotokos</u>, <u>Joy of all Who Sorrow</u>, which is a beautiful service to pray to our all Holy Lady, even if you only read a couple stanzas a night.

Here is a copy of the Akathist of Thanksgiving to our Lord, "Glory to God for All Things."

This service is so appropriate right now, because we really do have so much to be thankful for, but often lose sight amidst the stress and worry. The prayers in this Akathist are really beautiful, and were written by Metropolitan Tryphon of Turkestan not long before his death in 1934, when he was blind, sick, and the church in Russia was being persecuted. The title comes from the last words of Saint John Chrysostom as he died in exile in 407.

Paraklesis service to St. Nikephoros the Leper

St. Nikephoros (read about him <u>here</u>) lived with leprosy, a painful disease, yet radiated joy and peace. May his intercessions help all those affected by COVID-19 or any other diseases.

Many monasteries have started praying the **Jesus Prayer** and asking the faithful to join. I think this is a beautiful practice in general, but especially during these times. Even if you can only do 5 minutes, I highly recommend it. The Jesus Prayer brings a sense of peace and calm as you pray.

• The nuns of St. John Chrysostom Monastery have asked that everyone pray the Jesus Prayer from 8-8:15pm CST (9-9:15 EST) for the benefit and salvation of the world.

The monks on Mt. Athos are praying every night from 10:00pm to 10:15pm the Jesus prayer for the entire world, "Lord Jesus Christ, Son of God, have mercy upon your world" with their prayer ropes. We are asked to pray also in our respective time zones from 10pm - 10:15pm with this prayer.

<u>AGES Digital Chant Stand</u> has all the daily reader services (including hours, matins, vespers, and compline) with texts and sheet music - they have all the services for every day, plus I believe they are livestreaming some of the readers services on their Facebook page.








Even though St. Nicholas Greek School has closed its doors and events are cancelled, work continues. An alternative to in-person classes is being done. Adult classes continue with Toula Protopapa at the same time as they would normally attend in person by use of Skype--Beginners on Tuesday, Intermediates on Wednesday, and Advanced on Thursday. Children classes will also be resuming under the same format to the one used by the adult classes or a similar one. In addition, children are also continuing to use "Rebooting Greek" at home.

Even though the beautiful Salutations to our Most Holy Theotokos Services have been disrupted in the usual manner until the Corona virus has passed, we thank the children who prepared to read this year—Marianna Christou, Evan and Michael Chrysanthis, Konstandinos Karamalides, Yanna and Christos Mavrogeorgis, Mary Sider-Rose, Mia Velisaris. We also thank Julianna Chrysanthis and Deacon Robert who chanted the prayers on the first week.

Students are also continuing to prepare for the international proficiency exams, "Ellinomatheas." The exams are postponed by the Centre for Greek Language in Thessaloniki, Greece until November, but the registration deadline remained at March 22. Those exams are normally taken in May.

All the St. Nicholas Greek School children have been praying for little Elias Kazas and we are asking everyone to pray for him and his family. We all know that many miracles have happened and continue to happen through prayer. Please read the attachment about little Elias and his family and if you can offer some monetary assistance directly to the family, that would be appreciated.

As we are in the midst of Great Lent and the world is at a standstill with the pandemic, we pray that Panaghia shelters and guides all of us. Some of you may already know about the medical situation regarding Elias Kazas, who was diagnosed with an inoperable malignant brain tumor in January 2019, when he was 11 years old.

On his twelfth birthday, he had the first of several biopsies. The second biopsy, conducted at St. Jude Children's Research Hospital, showed that the cancer is a rare form which usually affects adults (approximately 300 cases per year in the USA).

To complicate matters, his type of cancer also has 2 mutations – making it even more rare (30 cases).

Little E or "E" has had radiation treatment at St. Jude's and is currently undergoing chemo (2 treatments every day, along with 2 anti-nausea drugs) in western PA through a partnership with St. Jude's and Children's Hospital of Pittsburgh (amazing places with amazing people who do amazing things).

With God's grace and mercy, he celebrated his 13th B-Day in January 2020!

"E" lives in Beaver, PA (outside of Pittsburgh) with his parents, Silvia and George.
He has an older brother Peter (19) who is a freshman at Chatham University and an older sister Elena (17) who is a junior at Beaver Area High School.

"E" has many interests, foremost among them is serving in the altar in his home parish of Kimisis Tis Theotokou in Aliquippa, PA.Nicknamed "the Hellenic Warrior", due to his fighting spirit, he also has a passion for all things "Greek" especially visiting his family in Kalamata, Greece where he chose to go on a trip sponsored by the Make a Wish Foundation.

"E" also loves the game of basketball – especially playing in tournaments with his GOYA friends! \square

HIS EMINENCE'S PASTORAL MESSAGE REGARDING THE PANDEMIC

We are hard-pressed on every side, yet not crushed; we are perplexed, but not in despair; persecuted, but not forsaken, struck down, but not destroyed- always carrying about in the body the dying of the Lord Jesus, that the life of Jesus also may be manifested in our body. (St. Paul's 2nd Letter to the Corinthians, 4:8-10.)

These words of the Holy Apostle Paul speak as forcefully to the Church throughout the world today as they did to the Christian community at Corinth to which they were initially addressed two thousand years ago. The specific trials may differ across time and cultures, but the challenges they present must be borne not with complaint and self-pity, but in a manner consonant with our life in the Lord Jesus. In our time we find ourselves confronted with a disease that threatens not only our lives but our manner of living. While we are tempted to focus on the affect the change in life has on each of us personally, our identity as a Christian community also requires us to consider more highly the needs of others rather than ourselves - in the words once again of Saint Paul, we are called to "Bear one another's burdens, and so fulfill the law of Christ." (Gal 6:2)

It is in this spirit of bearing the burdens of those at greatest risk to the current disease - the elderly, immunocompromised, those with respiratory conditions or diseases, and those who are unaware of potential complications - that we have been called in recent days to limit our interactions with others, in order to safeguard those in need around us. The need to self-limit has increased with our developing understanding of the present strain of coronavirus and the manner of its spreading. We are called to respond as the Body of Christ in a way that will protect the most vulnerable while remaining faithful to our identity as a community of prayer.



Please "stay tuned" for official updates regarding major Metropolis events (Summer Camp, St. Photios Banquet, etc.) and Archdicoesan events (Clergy-Laity Congress). While there are many updates coming from multiple sources (federal, state, county, and local government and government agencies; health agencies like the WHO and CDC; ecclesial bodies like the Ecumenical Patriarchate and the Archdiocese), please wait for confirmation from the Metropolis regarding anything affecting parish life.

In the meantime, our dedicated volunteers are working hard to plan the upcoming events, and will continue to prepare for them to run successfully. If they need to be postponed or cancelled, then we will shift gears. Thank you for your patience and understanding!

METROPOLIS AND PARISH OPERATIONS

His Eminence is cancelling his public appearances until further notice. Those who have been scheduled for visitations after March 31 will be informed by Archdeacon Ryan Gzikowski about the status of the visits.

The offices of the Metropolis of Pittsburgh will be officially closed effective immediately. Individual staff members can be contacted at their appropriate email addresses, which can be found at https://pittsburgh.goarch.org/metropolis-staff Keep in mind that while the offices are closed, there will be limited

access to mail, telephone, and office voicemail. The most effective means of communication is via email. We ask everyone to be patient as we attempt to maintain essential functionality under these conditions.

Non-essential gatherings (coffee hour, social activities, etc.) will be discontinued in all parishes. Classes and meetings (catechism. parish council and philoptochos, retreats) should be transitioned to videoconference. The guidelines promulgated by the respective states should be observed, especially with respect to fundraising activities of the parishes (like luncheons or fish frys).

Church services may continue as scheduled within our parishes, but the parishioners are directed to participate via the internet. A minimum compliment should be present at the parish (no more than 5 persons including the priest, all of whom should be physically healthy and at low risk for the disease, who will participate at the invitation of the priest). Those unable to participate via live streaming are encouraged to utilize other resources available to the faithful (see below). Those clergy, cantors, and parish leaders who fall within the higher risk groups (older than 65; having long-term respiratory conditions; being immunocompromised or living with the immunocompromised; etc.) must remain home.
