



## **FEBRUARY 2, 2021**

Candlemas, also called Presentation of the Lord or Presentation of Christ in the Temple or Hypapante, Christian festival on February 2 commemorating the occasion when the Virgin Mary, in obedience to Jewish law, went to the Temple in Jerusalem both to be purified 40 days after the birth of her son, Jesus, and to present him to God as her firstborn (Luke 2:22–38). The festival was formerly known in the Roman Catholic Church as the Purification of the Blessed Virgin Mary and is now known as the Presentation of the Lord. In the Anglican church it is called the Presentation of Christ in the Temple. In the Greek church it is called Hypapante (Meeting), in reference to Jesus' meeting in the Temple with the aged Simeon.

## FATHER'S MESSAGE

#### Beloved Sisters and Brothers in Christ:

God is holy, and wants us to be holy. . . (yawn). . . we've heard this message a thousand times, and most of us have probably dismissed it as impossible, or worse, undesirable. After all, it sounds so *boring* – standing around chanting all day, and denying oneself every possible pleasure in life. But to think this way is to fall into the trap of reducing the holy life to a false stereotype, so it can then be conveniently dismissed. When we do so, we short-change ourselves, because being holy does not mean boring, but rather whole, and wholesome – living life in the fullest sense of the word, to the best of our ability, at peace with ourselves, with our neighbors, our world, and – most importantly – with God. This was a lesson that my Dogmatics professor –Metropolitan Maximos of blessed memory – drove home to us time and again. For, the Orthodox faith sees the goal of the Christian life as union with God, which is actually a dynamic, never-ending process by which the believer, through God's grace, fulfills his or her humanity by becoming ever more God-like (holy). In doing so, we leave behind nothing but our sin – whatever that may be.

There is much to celebrate and take pleasure in, in this beautiful world: a sunny day, a reunion with loved ones, the mastery of a new skill, satisfaction in a job well done, sharing love with one's spouse, and much, much more. So, the problem is not with pleasure *per se*, but rather, with disordered pleasures – those which are contrary to God's will, because they are harmful to ourselves or to those who count on us. This is the bait that the evil one uses, in order to entice us into sinning. It is sin, then, which enslaves us and drags us down into bondage to the devil. This is the opposite of freedom. It cannot bring any lasting happiness.

What does our Lord offer us, instead? What can possibly make us more fully alive, more human, than we already are? What Christ offers us, by virtue of His sacrifice on the Cross for our sins, is nothing short of adoption into the family of God. Just as He is God's son by nature, so also has He given us the potential to become God's sons (children) by grace. And in doing so, we begin to understand and to taste what *true* freedom is: the "glorious liberty of the children of God" (Rom. 8:21). Freed from enslavement to our sin, we no longer need to succumb to the heartache and anxiety that characterized our former lives. We become "new persons," transformed by the grace of God working within us.

This new life of freedom does not necessarily require us to join a monastery or the priesthood – these are special vocations, which are only appropriate for those who have received them – but it does ask all of us to make some changes in our lives: first, to let go of that which keeps us far from God – such as our pride, our ego, and our destructive habits; and then, to allow God's Spirit to work within us, so that His gifts become our own: faith, hope, joy, peace, kindness, gentleness, and, especially LOVE.

February is the month when we begin the long road which leads to Great Lent and beyond. The Gospel readings call us to repent of our pride and learn humility (i.e., honesty about who we really are, and what we have done) (the Publican and the Pharisee); to return in humble repentance to our loving Father's embrace (the Prodigal Son); and to learn what it means to truly see the face of Christ in our neighbor in need (the Last Judgment). Here are three of the most important lessons, which, if heeded, can become the keys which unlock the chains which bind us.

Another valuable and necessary tool in throwing off the shackles of sin is the Sacrament of *Confession*. Through this mystery of our faith, our Lord comes to us just as the Father does in the parable of the Prodigal Son, to forgive, embrace, and reconcile Himself to us. Confession exists, not to humiliate the sinner or to entertain the priest, but rather, so that we can have a place to go to unload our burden of sorrow and guilt or true distress. It is the spiritual equivalent of going to see a doctor – like a vaccine for the soul, which helps to inoculate us against temptation and evil thoughts, in the same way that shots help to protect us from coming down with a deadly illness.

## FATHER'S MESSAGE, Con't

Even more, it can heal the soul, by putting behind us that which binds us, restoring hope, and bringing our flagging faith back to life. Please take advantage of it during this holy season. You will not regret it. I am available at any time, by appointment, for this purpose.

Holiness is not boring; it is *exciting*! It is a great venture of self-discovery, which leads us beyond ourselves into the presence of the Living God. It brings us untold blessings, which change us from within into what we were actually destined to become all along. It is God's gift of Himself to us, mediated through His Son, our Savior. It is the living water, the pearl of great price, the lost coin, indeed, the "one thing needful," the "good portion, which shall not be taken away." (Luke 10:42).

May the gracious God who makes everything new – including our hearts – be with you and yours, now, and always.

# WELCOME, EVERYBODY, TO ST. NICHOLAS CATHEDRAL! COME TRY OUT OUR NEW SOUND SYSTEM: HEAR AND WORSHIP IN PERSON OR HEAR AND WATCH FROM HOME!

PLEASE JOIN US FOR WORSHIP – on Sundays and weekdays, as scheduled. There are two good ways to do this – both of which just got better! That is because we are happy to announce that our new audio-visual system has finally been installed. That means that, if you are in the sanctuary, you will be able to hear the service far better and more clearly than you were before. And, if you are watching online from home, your viewing and listening experience should be greatly improved (it may take us a little time to tweak the new equipment).

**FIRST,** if your health permits, you can join us in person. Please be assured that the Cath edral has taken every possible step to minimize exposure to the COVID-19 virus or any other pathogen. This includes:

- 1) roping off a substantial portion of the seats, in order to enforce social distancing and keep individuals/family units isolated from one another;
- 2) Keeping a written record of everyone who attends each service for at least 30 days, in order to facilitate contact tracing, if needed;
  - 3) limiting social interaction outside of services (i.e., no coffee hour or other social events);
- 4) communing the faithful in as prudent a manner as possible (please remember to open your mouth wide so the gifts can be dropped in and hold the paper napkin under your chin!)
- 5) distributing the antidoron (blessed bread) in separate paper cups, in order to minimize contact with human hands; and finally and most importantly,
- 6) requiring all present to wear facial masks at all times, with the exception of the clergy and cantor while celebrating the service.

As long as you are feeling well on any given day (i.e., no fever, no cough, no gastro-intestinal symptoms, no loss of smell or taste, etc.), you are more than welcome worship in person!

**SECOND**, you can join us from home! We are overjoyed to announce that, our new audio-visual system having finally been installed, you may access all worship services as usual on your computer from our website – but this time, with greatly improved audio and visual quality. Also, all public services will be recorded, so that you can watch them later, if desired.

A HUGE THANK YOU to our committee from the Parish Council for their leadership in undertaking this project, and especially to all our incredibly generous donors who contributed in order to make this dream a reality. (It is not too late to make a donation: some expenses still remain. If interested, please send a check to the Church Office indicating that the gift is for the new sound system.)

That way, each one would have the responsibility of opening up the bookstore after church only once a month, rather than having to do it every week. This is clearly the fairest and most equitable way to handle the responsibility, so that means that we are hoping to recruit multiple volunteers.





## St. John the Forerunner's Community Outreach - More Than Food

Every month for over a decade, St. John the Forerunner in Boardman, OH has been hosting a meal for, on average, 50 to 70 people. Led by the Philoptochos society, the parish prepares and serves the meal while also donating clothing and canned goods as well.

Until the pandemic arrived in March 2020, the monthly meal meant parishioners also time spent talking and interacting with those in need. The program was forced on hiatus for six months due to the pandemic out of concern for the safety of the participants and fear of spreading the Coronavirus.

"Many of us are comfortable and for want of nothing," said George Denney, immediate past president of the parish council. "We can learn much from the people who come through our doors. They are lonely, experiencing hardship and may not have a home. But their smiles come not only from the food but the connection made between people." The ministry resumed in November 2020 as a takeaway meal. But the question on everyone's mind was 'when can we resume coming into the hall, sitting down and enjoying our meal—and the company,' according to Denney.

The outreach to inspire and motivate parishioners. After the first takeaway meal had enough leftovers to serve about 150 people at a Youngstown-area soup kitchen, a parishioner was moved to donate 10 turkeys, cases of mashed potatoes, vegetables and pumpkin pie at Thanksgiving time. All as a result of a community meal offered out of love for the least among us. One more benefit from the meal: The number of dinners served at St. John doubled from November to December. "The diners said to us, 'We can't wait until we can come in for a meal again. We miss our friends."


