

FATHER'S MESSAGE

"Ought not Christ to have suffered these things, and to enter into His glory?"

(Luke 24:26 – the words of the Risen Jesus on the road to Emmaus)

Beloved Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Greetings in our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ, who suffered and died for our salvation!

In recent months, our nation is once again reeling from numerous unprovoked and vicious gun attacks on multiple innocent people – too many too often, in fact, to even keep track. Each one is a terrible and senseless tragedy. Certainly, the ready availability of high-capacity weapons only serves to increase the number of victims. Burt regardless, only one other country on earth – Brazil – exceeds the United States of America in the number of senseless firearm killings that take place in a year.

During this period of a deadly pandemic, which continues to take more human lives here in the U.S. than in any other country, one would have thought that the number of violent incidents would have gone down. Sadly, though, this has not been the case. On the contrary, the numbers have gone up. In fact, 39,532 Americans lost their lives to gun violence in 2020 – the most in at least 20 years, according to the Gun Violence Archive. Even though it tends to be the mass attacks that get the most attention, the vast majority of acts of gun violence and murder take place on a far smaller, more intimate scale – in one's neighborhood or, especially, in one's home. Both suicide attempts and cases of spousal and/or child abuse have risen considerably. And, when firearms are present, someone's death is far more likely to be the final outcome.

Americans have had a love affair with guns for generations, and own far more of them per capita than any other country in the world. No doubt, in the vast majority of cases these firearms were legally purchased for hunting season or for self-defense. But, when troubles arise, their mere presence in the home can sometimes become a catalyst for their use against oneself or someone else who lives there. Out of fear, we purchased a gun. But, out of anger we end up using it. Guns can also tempt a curious child to somehow get ahold of one and accidentally discharge it — with tragic consequences.

Consideration of these sad realities during our own Lent and Holy Week brings special poignancy to this year's commemoration. We are reminded of the brief and fragile nature of human life, and come to realize that the seeming calm and order of both our civic and our personal lives is perhaps more illusion than reality. Indeed, one cannot help but wonder: why are human beings – not just in America, but around the world – so enamored with guns and violence? Why this fascination with the instruments of death? Why the quick rush to employ a permanent solution – the death of one's opponent – for a temporary problem? How did warfare and violence, with all the loss of life, destruction, and confusion they engender, come to play such dominant roles in human history? Who actually benefits from such madness – apart from gun manufacturers?

Warlords and empire-builders throughout history have reveled in the intoxicating chaos of battle and the satisfaction that comes from defeating defending armies and enslaving or massacring the losers. But no empire lasts forever, and, eventually, the conquerors become the conquered. Then, the former victors, now the vanquished, will ask: Was all that death and destruction actually worth it? Similarly, "crimes of passion" often end with the killers regretting their hasty resort to an act of violence, which only serves to end one life and make their own unlivable from guilt.

There *is* one who revels in this chaos, because he despises humanity – that is, Satan, the adversary. In the Gospel of John, Jesus discusses the devil: "He was a murderer from the beginning, and has nothing to do with the truth, because there is no truth in him. When he lies, he speaks according to his own nature, for he is a liar and the father of lies" (John 8:44). He also refers to the devil as a thief: "The thief comes only to steal and kill and destroy." The epidemic of gun violence truly does Satan's bidding, because it robs victims, both young and old, of their lives before their time.

And there is One who understands the value of human life more than all the rest of us: Our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. By contrast, He proclaims: "I came that they may have life and have it abundantly" (John 10:10). Indeed, Christ is the Good Shepherd, who also voluntarily "lays down [His] life for the sheep" (John 10:15) — that is, while He promises abundant life to His flock, He Himself must die in order that they may receive it: "Now is the judgment of this world, now shall the ruler of this world be cast out; and I, when I am lifted up from the earth, will draw all peoples to myself.' He said this to show by what death he was to die" (John 12:31-33). From the Cross, His extended arms tell us that He is ready to embrace all of humanity. In doing so, he fulfills the will of His Father: "For God so loved the world that he gave his only begotten Son, that whoever believes in him should not perish but have eternal life" (John 3:16). This is not an act of vengeance on the part of the Father, but rather, the highest expression of His infinite love for us. Jesus died, that we might live. And in doing so, He rendered it pointless for human beings to go on "solving" their problems by killing one another. Instead, He offers another gift, which costs nothing, but which has the potential to save countless human lives: "Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you, not as the world gives do I give to you. Let not your hearts be troubled, neither let them be afraid" (John 14:27).

Our problems and conflicts, apart from Christ, have the power to tear us apart and create enemies for life. This is especially true in this era of political polarization (which can often have a religious dimension to it). But there is a way to overcome our fear and rancor: In the light of the Resurrection, all things are made new, and even the unthinkable becomes possible, by God's grace: forgiving those who have wronged us or who have harmed us; letting go of our hurt and anger; asking for forgiveness and admitting wrong when we are at fault; replacing silent rancor with openness and honest but respectful dialogue; removing from our homes and our lives the things that may tempt us into destructive behavior, beginning with all firearms and ammunition, as well as alcohol and other mind-altering substances; learning anger management; and seeking help from our clergy or from a professional counselor. In this way, resentment and despair are replaced by understanding and hope. Peace can begin to reign in its own humble way, beginning with each one of our hearts. A new day has dawned: the Eighth Day, the first day of the New Creation.

In the light of the Resurrection, we also have another task ahead of us: to become advocates for sane restrictions on firearms in our country – especially for those which are designed for or which can be easily converted into instruments of mass murder. The continuing bloodletting solves nothing; all it accomplishes is to cut lives short, and it must stop.

Beloved brothers and sister in Christ: it is time for us to take seriously the words of St. Paul, who wrote, "For I am not ashamed of the gospel; it is the power of God for salvation to everyone who has faith, to the Jew first and also to the Greek" (Romans 1:16). And what is the content of that Gospel? It is the reality of the Cross, and of the Empty Tomb. This is the truth that anchors our life, that gives it meaning and purpose. This is the source of our faith, and the reason for our hope. Because of this truth, St. Paul can also say, regarding Christ, "For he is our peace; in his flesh he has made both groups into one and has broken down the dividing wall, that is, the hostility between us." (Ephesians 2:14). God has the power, through His Son, the Prince of Peace, to heal our hearts and make us one. He can restore our peace, on every level — if only we have the will to let Him do so.

The services of Holy Week are a journey, which take us from the triumphant entry of our Lord into Jerusalem, through a time of vigil with the Bridegroom, to the Last Supper, the Betrayal, the Trial, the Crucifixion, and beyond. Through them, the Church invites us to enter with Jesus into the very mystery at the heart of our salvation: namely, that the Incarnate God gave His life, He "suffered these things," so that we might be renewed from within, and, having learned the ways of forgiveness and mercy and truth, live with Him in glory forever in Heaven.

FATHER'S MESSAGE, Con't

For Orthodox Christians, the New Life in Christ is not something to be lived by us strictly as individuals, or even in the private company of our families. It is something to be experienced in the context of the entire community of faith, which is the Church. As we grow closer to God, we also grow closer to one another. Come, then, and worship with us; come and receive the Light from the Light which knows no night; come, and be renewed in heart and soul; come, and, putting all bitterness aside in sharing the Common Cup, experience the sweet taste of the Peace which "passes all understanding!"





On another note, students preparing for taking the Ellinomatheas Exams will not be taking them in May of 2021. The test is postponed until October of 2021.

St. Nicholas Cathedral Greek School History

A few months ago I spoke with Mr. James Agras about his father, Mr. Rudolph Agraphiotis, and the beginnings of our beloved Greek School. Mr. Rudolph Agraphiotis was a very special person with many gifts given to him by our Lord and whose gifts he used to help the communities and ministries flourish and grow for decades. The following article is written by Mr. James Agras and Mrs. Electra Agras, with their permission to have it printed, and is an enlightening and inspirational article to be archived in our community and our nation.

The Genesis of Greek School at St. Nicholas Cathedral

As a result of the Turkish oppression, Rudolph Agraphiotis fled Smyrna and emigrated to Mitelene on the Island of Lesvos. There he met his wife-to-be, Sophia, whose family had also emigrated from Smyrna. He received his high school and college education in Mitelene and then attended the Sorbonne in Paris where he received his Masters degree in French in 1920. He then accepted a faculty position to teach French at the College of William & Mary in Williamsburg, Virginia.

After three years there he accepted the position/challenge to launch a new Greek school program at St. Nicholas, as well as manage the church office. Simultaneously, Reverend Athanasios Avlonitis, Sophia's father, and family came to the USA where he accepted the position of parish priest at the Church of the Annunciation in Norfolk, Virginia. Rudolph and Sophia were married there in 1924 in a ceremony officiated by her father.

Greek classes were taught to elementary and high school students after public school hours on the second floor of the small social hall behind the church, three days a week including Saturdays. Within the first year news of the school's rapid success circulated in the Greek communities in the Oakland and East Liberty neighborhoods, and beyond. Score of younger students enrolled guaranteeing the perpetuation of the Greek school as additional teachers were hired...Mr. Sithergos...Mr.Diacoyannis and Mr. Tsikerdanos.

red pencil and return them. He was lovingly nicknamed "Aggie." Note: a similar story is told by "Aggie's" son, Jim, who while on active duty would write to his father in French which Jim majored in college. Likewise, those many letters were appropriately corrected in red pencil and immediately returned to him. This, in truth, was the dedicated and consummate teacher.

Around 1926 Mr. Agraphiotis founded the St. Nicholas choir. While studying at the Sorbonne he became assistant choir director of the St. Stephen's Cathedral the Metropolis of Paris. With that meaningful experience he was able for the first time create a choir at St. Nicholas. Over the years scores of the students taught in Greek school became members of the choir, as did many of their children over nearly 30 years.

He personally arranged this sacred music into beautiful four part Byzantine choral. Those choir members made a serious commitment to attend all rehearsals (some on Friday nights) and attend the Sunday services...choir door locked promptly at 9:55 AM for a 10:00 AM service. The choir became acclaimed regionally as the finest.

In closing it is ironic that on December 24, 1952, while preparing for midnight Christmas services with the choir, Mr. Agraphiotis suffered a severe heart attack and was rushed to Allegheny General hospital. He passed away Christmas day at age 56.




