

# Important Notice from Metropolitan Savas

The recent surge in coronavirus cases in our general area, and in our parish communities in particular, has been cause for concern. This has affected clergy and laity, old and young, vaccinated and unvaccinated alike. While we maintain our ultimate trust and hope in God's providence for our lives, we also recognize the fundamental scriptural call for each of us to safeguard one another, especially the most vulnerable among us, regardless of how we perceive the risks to ourselves; we are called to love one another self-sacrificially, to bear each other's burdens, and to be our brother's and sister's keeper.

# Therefore, I am implementing a masking mandate at all Church-related functions (whether on Church property or not) and for all non-Church functions taking place on Church property, effective immediately and until further

**notice**. For those who are unable to mask, in-person participation in worship and meetings will not be possible, so each community should make reasonable accommodations; contact your parish priest for sacramental needs, and any essential meetings should have an option for participation via electronic means (telephone or videoconference).

I ask you to continue to make supplication to the Lord, to the Theotokos, and to the healing Saints (especially the recently canonized St. Nicephoros the Leper) for those affected by the pandemic: those who have been ill, the doctors and medical workers treating them, supporting family whose loved ones have died or been negatively impacted, those who are suffering job loss or financial instability, and those who suffer with anxiety or other psychological conditions; and may our God grant rest to all those who have departed this life in hope of the Resurrection.

#### FATHER'S MESSAGE

For he chose us in him before the creation of the world to **be holy** and blameless in his sight.

- Ephesians 1:4

February 2022

Beloved Sisters and Brothers in Christ:

God is holy, and wants us to **be holy**... (yawn)... we've heard this message a thousand times, and most of us have probably dismissed it as impossible, or worse, undesirable. After all, it sounds so boring – standing around chanting all day, and denying oneself every possible pleasure in life. But to think this way is to fall into the trap of reducing the holy life to a false stereotype, so it can then be conveniently dismissed. When we do so, we short-change ourselves, because being holy does not mean boring, but rather whole, and wholesome – living life in the fullest sense of the word, to the best of our ability, at peace with ourselves, with our neighbors, our world, and – most importantly – with God. This was a lesson that my Dogmatics professor – who happens to have been His Eminence Metropolitan Maximos of blessed memory – drove home to us time and again. For, the Orthodox faith sees the goal of the Christian life as union with God, which is actually a dynamic, never-ending process by which the believer, through God's grace, fulfills his or her humanity by becoming ever more God-like (holy). In doing so, we leave behind nothing but our sin – whatever it may be. We also are gifted to develop the potential to see all things as they really are, in all their pristine glory, as God created them – and not as they normally appear to us, in our fallen human state.

There is much to celebrate and take pleasure in, in this beautiful world: a sunny day, a reunion with loved ones, the mastery of a new skill, satisfaction in a job well done, sharing love with one's spouse, and much, much more. So, the problem is not with pleasure *per se*, but rather, with disordered pleasures – those which are contrary to God's will, because they are harmful to ourselves or to those who count on us. This is the bait that the evil one uses, in order to entice us into sinning. It is sin, then, which enslaves us and drags us down into bondage to the devil. This is the opposite of freedom. It cannot bring any lasting happiness.

What does our Lord offer us, instead? What can possibly make us more fully alive, more human, than we already are? What Christ offers us, by virtue of His sacrifice on the Cross for our sins, is nothing short of adoption into the family of God. Just as He is God's son by nature, so also has He given us the potential to become God's sons (children) by grace. And in doing so, we begin to understand and to taste what *true* freedom is: the "glorious liberty of the children of God" (Rom. 8:21). Freed from enslavement to our sin, we no longer need to succumb to the heartache and anxiety that characterized our former lives. We become "new persons," God's children, transformed by the grace of God working within us.

This new life of freedom does not necessarily require us to join a monastery or the priesthood – these are special vocations, which are only appropriate for those who have received them – but it does ask all of us to make some changes in our lives: first, to let go of that which keeps us far from God – such as our pride, our ego, and our destructive habits; and then, to allow God's Spirit to work within us, so that His gifts become our own: faith, hope, joy, peace, kindness, gentleness, and, especially LOVE.

## FATHER'S MESSAGE, Con't

February is the month when we begin the long road which leads to Great Lent and beyond. The Gospel readings are intended to prepare us for this "journey to Pascha," as the late, great Orthodox theologian Fr. Alexander Schmemann, referred to Lent. These readings call us to repent of our pride and learn humility (i.e., honesty about who we really are, and what we have done) (the Publican and the Pharisee); to return in humble repentance to our loving Father's embrace (the Prodigal Son); and to learn what it means to truly see the face of Christ in our neighbor in need (the Last Judgment). Here are three of the most important lessons from Christ's parables, which, if heeded, can become the keys which unlock the chains which bind us.

Another valuable and necessary tool in throwing off the shackles of sin is the Sacrament of *Confession*. Through this mystery of our faith, our Lord comes to us just as the Father does in the parable of the Prodigal Son, to forgive, embrace, and reconcile Himself to us. Confession exists, not to humiliate the sinner or to entertain the priest, but rather, so that we can have a place to go to unload our burden, whatever it may be, and put behind us that which holds us back from making progress on our journey. It is the spiritual equivalent of going to see a doctor. It heals the soul. It restores hope, and brings our flagging faith back to life. Please take advantage of it during this holy season! I am available at any time, by appointment, for this purpose – as are all the Orthodox priests in our area.

Holiness is not boring; it is *exciting*! It is a great venture of self-discovery, which leads us beyond ourselves into the presence of the Living God. It brings us untold blessings, which change us from within into what we were actually destined to be all along. It is God's gift of Himself to us, mediated through His Son, our Savior. It is the living water, the pearl of great price, the lost coin, indeed, the "one thing needful," the "good portion, which shall not be taken away." (Luke 10:42).

May the gracious God who makes everything new – including our hearts – be with you and yours, now, and always.

# Theophany & the Blessing of the Waters

**"WHAT IS THEOPHANY?"** Every year on January 5 & 6 we celebrate the great feastday of the Theophany of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. The Baptism of Christ in the River Jordan by St. John the Baptist presents us with a great mystery of God: "He who is the Master of all is baptized by a servant, and He gives mankind cleansing through water."

"WHAT IS A HOUSE BLESSING?" In celebration of Theophany, Orthodox Christians invite Christ not only into their hearts, but also their homes. We call upon Him to bring the blessings and spiritual cleansing of the Jordan into our daily lives. We do this each year by having the priest bless our homes with the Holy Water from the service of Theophany, offering prayers for our health, our family, and the Lord's abundant blessings in the coming year.

"WHAT DO I NEED TO DO?" When Fr. Christopher visits, please have ready: 1) a list of names of your family members, 2) an icon. He will begin the service in the dining room or in the area of your home where you keep your icons, and then he will ask you to guide him around the house so that he may sprinkle the Holy Water throughout it. During the service, please turn off televisions, radios, etc., and silence your cell phones, so that full concentration may be given to the service.

**"WHAT ABOUT BUSINESSES?"** You may also request a blessing for your office or business. What better way to offer thanks to the Lord for your livelihood which He provides and to ask for His continued blessings upon it?

**BLESSING OF HOMES:** After the Holy Water Service on January 6, Fr. Christopher will begin blessing the homes of our parish with holy water. This year he will be blessing homes by appointment from January 6 on.

A son of the late Archon Nicholas & Stavroula Papadakos, Peter Clyde was an engaged member of the Church his entire life, learning to chant from a young age and applying this gift for more than five decades in three different parishes. He



further enhanced the music ministry in the Pittsburgh area by offering free instruction in Byzantine Music to many individuals through the years.

He was a dedicated servant of the Metropolis, serving on the Council since its inception in 1979, spending most of those years as its Secretary and Legal Counsel. He was frequently involved as a co-chair or key facilitator of major events, and offered his love and talents to many, assisting with Greek Education, the Armonia Chorus, Youth Ministry, chanting in other parishes on feastdays, ordinations, funerals, and other sacraments. This he did while also remaining among the longest-participating members of the Grecian Odyssey Dancers of Ypapanti GOC of East Pittsburgh, with whom he performed 835 shows.

## Prepare Now for a Successful Oratorical Festival


Procrastination is a regular part of our lives. But organizers of the St. John Oratorical Festival — at the parish, Metropolis and Archdiocesan levels — are doing their best to make sure we're not waiting until the last minute by offering ways to prepare for success today. For example, the topics for the oratorical festival were published in November 2021 and can be found online at:

In the Metropolis of Pittsburgh, oratorical festival organizer Ann Ariano offers the following tips for a successful parish event:

- Include the list of topics in your Parish's monthly/weekly newsletter.
- Distribute the list and remind students of the festival dates during GOYA meetings.
- Brainstorm ideas for speeches into the Sunday School Curriculum for 7th-12th grades (beginning in January)
- If your Parish has had a past Metropolis or National Finalist, ask him her to speak to your Sunday School GOYA about their experience.
- Make the Parish Festival a formal event, consider including a meal for the participants and their families, invite the entire parish to attend.
- Encourage 4-6th grade students to participate in the Elementary Division of the Festival and have speeches at the same time as your Junior/Senior speakers to gain experience speaking in public and to be inspired by their older peers.
- Ask Festival Judges to provide written constructive feedback to all speakers - including Elementary participants.
- Consider offering scholarships (to camps, for example) or other incentives. Also consider asking Parish organizations such as Philoptochos, AHEPA, Sunday School, etc. for donations towards scholarships. Elementary participants can each receive a small gift or cash award.
- In the weeks that follow your Parish Festival, allow the participants to give their speeches in church so the entire community may hear them.
