

Holy Week comes to an end at sunset of Great and Holy Saturday, as the Church prepares to celebrate her most ancient and preeminent festival, Pascha, the feast of feasts.

The time of preparation will give way to a time of fulfillment. The glorious and resplendent light emanating from the empty Tomb will dispel the darkness. Christ, risen from the dead, cracks the fortress of death and takes "captivity captive" (Psalm 67:19).

All the limitations of our createdness are torn asunder. Death is swallowed up in victory and life is liberated. "For as by a man came death, by a man came also the resurrection of the dead. For as in Adam all die, so also in Christ shall all be made alive" (I Corinthians 15:21-22).

FATHER'S MESSAGE

April 1, 2022

Brethren, rejoice in the Lord always; again, I will say rejoice. Let all men know your forbearance. The Lord is at hand. Have no anxiety about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which passes all understanding, will keep your hearts and minds in Christ Jesus.

Philippians 4:4-7 (read at the Palm Sunday Liturgy)

Beloved Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

Greetings in our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ, crucified for our salvation!

When Jesus ascended Mt. Tabor and was transfigured, He took his three closest disciples with Him: Peter, James, and John. All three misunderstood, in some way, the import of what they witnessed: Peter spoke too soon, and so brought the event to an end; while James and John, not long after, inappropriately asked the Lord to give them special honors in His kingdom, as if He were an earthly king, accustomed to doling out favors. And when the others heard, they denounced the two brothers, not because they thought it disrespectful, but because they wanted the honor for themselves. Similarly, the Lord predicted His Passion and Death on at least three occasions. The disciples, however, either did not take Him seriously, or contradicted Him. When Jesus entered Jerusalem in triumph soon after, the people welcomed Him with palms and branches, because they thought He would soon engage in battle to deliver them from the hated Romans. When He did not meet their expectations, they turned against Him. Clearly, the traditional image of the Messiah as a political hero, who would deliver his people from their oppressors, dominated Jewish thought in Jesus' time – even among his closest followers!

Who is Jesus Christ? In every age and era, people have asked this question, and usually answered it in a way that suited their purposes or fit their particular ideology. In the modern era, he has been identified as a teacher, a revolutionary, a peasant, a magician, a warrior, a philosopher, a mystic, and even, a clown (in the musical Godspell). Such theories usually tell us more about their authors, than they do about the true identity of our Savior. More often than not, they miss the point completely – not only about who Jesus truly was, but also why He suffered what He did, and why it should matter to us.

The true identity of the Savior can be found in the Holy Scriptures (especially the New Testament), our surest source of information about Him. And the theological teachings of our Orthodox faith are based on the critical work of the great Fathers of the Church, who struggled to understand and explain that same sacred book, the *Bible*. As they did so, they realized that their most important goal was to preserve and defend its central message: that Jesus Christ is Lord, the Incarnate God, the Son of God who became the son of Mary, in order to save us from sin and death through His own death on the Cross and glorious Resurrection. Their work established a consensus about the identity of Christ that lasted until modern times and is still adhered to by the vast majority in every Christian faith tradition.

Soon we will get a chance to live this truth in a visceral way. Through the services of Holy Week, the Orthodox Church tries to communicate the reality of the Lord's Passion, Death, and Resurrection to the faithful in such a manner that we enter into the mystery with our entire being, and not just with our intellect. In this way, it becomes a *personal encounter* with the Lord Himself, which renews our spirit and strengthens our faith. Who is Jesus Christ? *Come and see!* (John 1:39).

FATHER'S MESSAGE, Con't

In this time of a terrible and unjust war that threatens the entire world order — even while humanity is still facing a deadly pandemic, in this era of threats real and imagined, of economic uncertainty and hardship, of political polarization and bitter disagreement throughout our nation, it is understandable that anger, fear, and anxiety have taken root in many a heart. We have suffered through some tremendous disappointments and setbacks, and predictions for the future seem to point to much worse to come. Yet, as Christians we must never give in to anger, fear, or despair. Our Heavenly Father is greater than any of this, and His love for us is steadfast and sure. That is why He sent His Son, and why Jesus had to die on the Cross. He showed us that life is stronger than death, that love conquers hatred in the act of loving, and that the victory over sin, death, injustice and evil that we all long for cannot ever be accomplished by the force of arms. Rather, it was assured by the humiliation and unjust execution of an innocent itinerant preacher from Nazareth. His sacrifice broke the power of Satan and opened the gates of Paradise to us once and for all.

One aspect of this new war in Ukraine that is especially horrifying to those of us who are adherents of the Orthodox Christian faith is that historically, *both sides share that same faith*. How is it possible that that the one, without any plausible provocation, attacks the other, and, even worse, is deliberately targeting innocent civilians, including women and children in shelters and hospitals? How can the daughter attack the mother? You see, the Orthodox faith was first adopted in Kiev in 800 A.D., among the Slavic people living there who were called the *Rus* (a reference to the Scandinavian Vikings who ruled them at that time) but who today constitute the Ukrainian nation. Only later was it brought by missionaries from that region to the Slavic tribes living north and east of there, in what is now Russia proper, including Moscow.

What can we do, as Orthodox Christians in America, in response to what we are seeing and hearing about every day on television or the internet? We are neither policymakers nor generals. And yet, we still do have an important job to do, because we live under the sign of the Cross – which, in the kontakion proper to the Feast-day of the Elevation of the Cross, is called "a weapon for peace, and invincible standard." So, what is our duty as Christians? In the name of Christ, we can pray for peace and for a just end to this conflict, and we can work to reduce the suffering of the Ukrainian people through our contributions to any of the charitable organizations who are offering assistance during this frightening time – as we have already begun to do as a congregation, through a basket passed recently to send to International Orthodox Christian Charities (I.O.C.C.). Looking ahead, we might also eventually consider offering a more personal kind of aid, either as private citizens or as a parish family, by sponsoring or assisting refugee families, when they eventually begin to arrive in our country.

Our politicians have an important job to do, in bringing such conflicts to an end. So, they, too, deserve our prayers. But the solutions available to them in this war, involving as it does an aggressor with the largest nuclear arsenal in the world, can only be partial. This is because they are based on what they perceive as being actually *possible*, in our broken and dangerous world, rather than what would truly be *necessary*, in order for peace with justice and mercy to prevail.

Ultimately, the message of the Gospel is truly our one and only hope. As our Lord told His disciples at the Last Supper, "I have said this to you, that in me you may have peace. In the world you have tribulation; but be of good cheer, I have overcome the world." This message ought to be a source of profound and lasting comfort to us, in this new "age of anxiety." That is why St. Paul was bold enough to write to the Philippians (as I noted above): "And the peace of God, which passes all understanding, will keep your hearts and minds in Christ Jesus." (Phil. 4:7) Or, as the Evangelist John put it: The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it (John 1:5).

FATHER'S MESSAGE, Con't

In addition to our own prayer, we can also turn to God's closest friends, the glorified *Saints* of our church – most especially, the Most Holy Theotokos – and ask them to join their prayers for peace to our own. Because we focus on the Mother of God and our mother in the faith every Friday night for five weeks in the course of Great Lent, during the Salutations services, we have an opportunity to do just that. I cordially invite all of you to join us on Friday, April 8 for the final service, when we chant the entire Akathist Hymn (don't worry – the service doesn't last all night!). This year, we will also include a brief litany in order to pray for the restoration of peace throughout the world, and especially in Ukraine. We will also once again pass a tray to send to I.O.C.C. earmarked for victims of this conflict.

When the bishop or the priest comes out of the altar into the darkened sanctuary with the lone paschal candle on Holy Saturday night, he is proclaiming that Jesus Christ is the light and the life of the world, the one who overcame evil and death, and opened the door to heaven for all humanity. By His sacrificial death and glorious Resurrection, He taught us how to love – truly love – our fellow human beings, and thus become ambassadors for God's eternal Kingdom of grace and peace in this dark and murderous world. So then, beloved brothers and sisters in Christ, we must not fear the darkness, but rather, rejoice in the Light, and become light bearers, as well. May His peace and humility and love enliven our hearts, both at this joyous time of year, and always.

MAINTENANCE

Update from the St. Nicholas Maintenance Committee

The committee would like to provide a short report on facility projects and updates that have completed over the past 6 months.

- The lowering mechanisms for the fire escape from the second-floor classrooms was no longer functioning and has been replaced. It now operates smoothly.
- A permanent railing was installed around the steps between the narthex and the atrium. This will prevent falls that have happened when someone exits the narthex and does not realize there are steps down to the atrium.
- A railing was also installed along the edge of the choir loft. The height of
 the original railing was more than a foot below current safety standards,
 increasing the risk of someone falling off the choir loft. The new railing
 addresses the safety risk and has a minimal visual impact.
- Damaged or stained ceiling tiles in both the large and small halls have replaced.
- A new washer and dryer have been installed to replace the ones that were purchased 15 years ago.
- The broken locking / hinge mechanisms for the atrium glass doors have been replaced.
- An electrical surge from a lightning storm caused damage throughout the facility, particularly to the elevator controls. Repeated visits from the elevator repair service finally fixed the elevator outages. We are currently planning surge protection on the power input line for the building.
- The exhaust fans in the restrooms have been replaced.

Thank you for your Stewardship donations and donations to the St. Nicholas Building Fund, which enable us to do these projects and maintain our church.







CHURCH SCHOOL ICON PROCESSION on Sunday, March 13th


















Philoptochos News


Over the last 2 years, with your gracious support we have **donated more than \$40,000** to those in need, all because of our generous members, benefactors, and successful fundraisers.


