

MARCH 25, 2023

Greek Independence Day, national holiday celebrated annually in Greece on March 25, commemorating the start of the War of Greek Independence in 1821.

It coincides with the <u>Greek</u> <u>Orthodox Church</u>'s celebration of the <u>Annunciation</u> to the <u>Theotokos</u>, when the Archangel <u>Gabriel</u> appeared to Mary and told her that she would bear the son of God.

FATHER'S MESSAGE

Blessed is God, who desires that all people should be saved, and come to the knowledge of the Truth; both now and ever, and to the ages of ages. Amen.

- Based on 1Timothy 2:4

Beloved Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

Greetings of the Lenten season in our Lord God and Savior Jesus Christ!

The above verse, the core of which is taken from one of St. Paul's epistles, is quoted at the conclusion of the ancient "Making of a Catechumen" service that still precedes every Baptism that takes place in the Orthodox Church, harkening back to the early centuries of our faith. This was a time when the majority of candidates were received as adults. They would go through a lengthy period of instruction in preparation for their Baptism and Chrismation – most often, during the period of the Great Fast. Nowadays, of course, we receive most of our "catechumens" in their infancy or early childhood, so as to bless them with the grace imparted by God through the Holy Sacraments from their youngest years.

But, what does it mean, to "be saved and come to the knowledge of the truth"? It means that, by the grace of God and the inspiration of the Holy Spirit – and conveyed to us through the hard work of those who teach us – we can be fully instructed in the basic tenets of our faith, both about what we believe and how we live it out. It presupposes that we accept and practice it throughout our lives, growing in our understanding over the years, beginning from the day of our baptism onward. It is God's free gift to us through grace, but one which, we Orthodox believe, we must also voluntarily embrace – say "Yes" to.

At the same time, the Church also recognizes that it is not particularly easy to accept and live out our faith in its fullness. As long as we endure in this life, we will always be tempted by times of doubt and by the attractive nature of the passions of the flesh so-called, such as gluttony, greed, lust, pride, laziness, self-centeredness, etc. That we also live in a time of diminishing faith, not just here in the United States but also in much of the Western world, doesn't help.

We have once again entered into the period of the Great Forty-day Fast (Μεγάλη Τεσσαρακοστή), which the Church established many centuries ago. Periods of fasting such as this were not adopted in order to inconvenience or punish us, but rather to assist us in maintaining our growth in our faith and closeness to our Lord God and Savior Jesus Christ. You might say that this period is designed to help us to overcome the corrosive and even death-dealing effects of living in a fallen world. The Great Fast (Lent) is characterized not only by simplifying our diet through restrictions on what we eat (see below*), but also by an increase in the number and kind of divine services, as well as encouragement to devote more time to prayer and reading the Bible and other inspired texts.

*No meat, milk, dairy products, (or fish – except for March 25 (the Annunciation) and Palm Sunday); no olive oil or alcoholic beverages – except on weekends and, in addition to the above, these additional feast days: March 9 (40 Martyrs of Sebaste), March 30 (Great Canon of St. Andrew of Crete), and Holy Thursday. Crustaceans (i.e., shrimp) and shellfish (i.e., clams, scallops, etc.) are permitted throughout. See the Church calendar. (The Fast can be "loosened" for growing children, the ill, the infirm, etc. - but at least some effort should be made to observe this sacred time and encourage the development of habits that foster self-control of one's appetites and passions.)

FATHER'S MESSAGE, Con't

We are also challenged at this time of year to give more thought to how best we can assist those in need – remembering that this is our Lord's expectation of us, based on His parable of the Last Judgment, which we hear on the Sunday of Meatfare, the week prior to the start of the Fast. He spoke of important and basic human needs, indicating that we are expected to take care of and assist others in trouble: the hungry, the thirsty, the stranger in need of shelter, the naked (i.e., those in need of clothing), the ill, and those in prison. In our day, we often don't realize that these challenges still exist for millions all around us – not just far away and on other continents, but also here at home. We see this especially in our poorer neighborhoods in big cities, and in many rural communities where adequate employment opportunities are lacking. We are also facing a real crisis among the growing number of homeless whose mental illness, addiction problems, criminal record, loss of employment, or victimization has put them out on the street. But we must always remember that there is no such thing as a "throw-away" person. Jesus was full of compassion for those who were suffering. He also understood the importance of recognizing the dignity of every human being, created as we are in His image and likeness – and so He treated everyone the same, regardless of their ethnicity and social standing. So should we.

In our time, it strikes me that attention to the implications of what it means to be created in God's "image and likeness" is the last thing on the mind of most Americans. On the contrary, we all face the continuing challenges of living in a society where hatred and fear of "the other," as well as the deliberate scapegoating of those who differ from us in various ways, is widespread. Indeed, equality and respect among all human beings may be preached as a fundamental value and right in our country, but that does not mean that it is always observed in practice. On the contrary, in the millions of cases where people have the "wrong" skin color or ethnic or religious background, they are far more likely to be treated as second-class citizens and sometimes even be singled out for persecution or neglect.

This can have grave outcomes. Here in Pittsburgh, no one who was alive then will ever forget the deadly attack by a mad racist on Tree of Life Synagogue and two other congregations in the same building in 2018 that left eleven dead and six more gravely wounded. Their only "crime" was being present in a synagogue for worship, as appropriate, on a Saturday morning. Since then, antisemitism has gotten much worse, not better, across the country.

Sometimes, prejudice can be more subtle, but still have real consequences. For instance, in 2019 a report was issued that revealed data showing that Pittsburgh has just about the worst maternal mortality rates for African American women than any comparable city in the country. At the same time, our fair city also has a significantly higher infant mortality rate among this same population demographic than other metropolitan areas. This is true, regardless of the economic status or educational level attained by the mother. The only possible explanation that the researchers could come up with was that these patients as a class must routinely have been subjected to inferior medical care.

If Jesus walked among us today, what would he say about these injustices? Would He remain silent, and "go along to get along?" Or would he denounce the offenders, and give comfort to the victims? I suspect that He would find the denial the full humanity of even *one* of the billions who inhabit this precious earth and this country to be unacceptable. I am reminded of the words that our greatest playwright in the English language, William Shakespeare, put in the mouth of his character, Shylock the Moneylender: "I am a Jew. Hath not a Jew eyes? Hath not a Jew hands, organs, dimensions, senses, affections, passions? Fed with the same food, hurt with the same weapons, subject to the same diseases, healed by the same means, warmed and cooled by the same winter and summer as a Christian is? If you prick us, do we not bleed? If you tickle us, do we not laugh? If you poison us, do we not die?"

FATHER'S MESSAGE, Con't

Indeed, we humans tend to deny the common humanity that we share with every other person on this planet – regardless of their faith, color, gender, national origin, intelligence, wealth, or poverty. Our ancient, early human brains tell us that, if they look or act differently from us, then we ought not to trust them. How easy it is to forget that we are all created in the same God's image and likeness, and that God in His infinite love does not discriminate among His human children under any circumstances! All of these differences are superficial, reflecting where our ancestors came from. But the human race is one.

Brothers and sisters in Christ, I do not mention these matters in order to ruin your day, or to make anyone depressed or angry. I mention them because they are a real and true part of the world we have inherited and live in, and so, inevitably, they influence us, just as they do on everyone else. But, it does not have to be this way. We can rise above these prejudices. Those of us who share Greek ancestry, for instance, can look to our own past in this country, in order to understand just how oppressive racial prejudice can be. Perhaps we have forgotten, or we never told, that it wasn't that long ago when Greek immigrants coming to this country as refugees from extreme poverty and from persecution by the Turks and subsequent invaders were treated with suspicion and contempt by their new neighbors in America. "White" Americans felt so threatened by this influx of dark-complexioned Southern Europeans that they even changed the immigration laws in order to put a strict limit of the number of arrivals from these countries, which remained official policy for many years. Nothing precludes the return of such attitudes in the future.

And today, while circumstances may have improved since that sad era, this does not mean that it is time for us to join the ranks of those who remain stuck in the muck of bigotry. Rather, remembering our past history, let us embrace the stranger and comfort the afflicted. Let us find more and more opportunities to reach out to the larger community in a more deliberate way, offering whatever possible assistance we can to those in need. Let us also offer acceptance and love to those who come to us seeking to hear the Good News and find their spiritual home – regardless of their own place of origin, personal appearance, or background. Let us take care to remember those who are alone and reach out to them. And let us treat everyone we meet throughout the day and over the years with the same love, respect and good will that our precious Lord exhibited when He walked this earth, and still offers to us as a free gift of grace.







Let's all celebrate together this beautiful event – The Beginning of our Salvation and the Independence of Greece's 400 years of slavery. 





YOUTH SAFETY WORKERS

Who is considered a Youth Safety Worker?

All Clergymen (Bishops/Priests/Deacons, both Active

& Retired)

Pastoral Assistants & Youth Directors People assisting, in any ministry, where the participants are under 18 years of age or in high school, whichever is later.

Including Parish Youth Safety Administrators, Church School Teachers, Dance Directors, Greek School Teachers, Youth Advisors (including Chaperones & Drivers) and Parish Council. Even... Parents who occasionally help-out, but are alone with other people's children.

Each Youth Safety Worker is required to register yearly with the church.

Registration is available through the church office. In addition, all Youth Safety Workers are required to take two courses (on-line training platform) annually and to complete a background check every other year.

Here is the website: Please register at https://ncsrisk.org/goarch/. The first course, Youth Safety, has two parts. The second course, Youth Worker Regulations, has one part. Prompt completion is necessary as one cannot participate in any youth programs without being registered, having a background check, having PA state clearances, and completing the two courses.

CEILING RESTORATION PROJECT

Cathedral Ceiling Repair Update #13 - Cost Summary

Sunday, January 22 was a wonderful day! We were able to celebrate the Divine Liturgy once again in our sanctuary and the atmosphere was joyous. This will be the final update on the ceiling repair and the good news is the total project cost is about \$275,000. This is \$95,000 less that the original estimate (August) and \$50,000 less than the revised one (November). The largest differences from original estimate are summarized below.

- <u>Plastering and Painting</u> came in \$95,000 less than the original estimate. This was because much less of the ceiling needed to be re-plastered than what was originally estimated. In addition, Petrinos Painting donated the cost of their overhead and profit.
- The cost of scaffolding was \$25,000, less primarily because the job was completed much quicker, eliminating several months of rent charges for scaffolding. Thanks to our primary contractors, Nick Lardas, NIKO Contracting, and Petrinos Painting kept the project well-staffed and always in-work to reduce the span of repair time.
- The cost of Engineering and Project Management came in about \$25,000 less than
 estimated mostly because the time period and overall amount of work was less.

Of course, there were several items that come in over their cost estimate. Repairing the cracked joists that supported the dome cost \$20,000 and was not anticipated (but very fortunate to be discovered). Also, the cost of erecting and removing the protective coverings for items within the church ended up costing about \$20,000 more than estimated. There were several other smaller cost increases, for example, re-painting some deteriorated wall paint in areas that were assessable with the scaffolding.

Thanks to the outpouring of support from the parish, this new project cost is within the reach of being raised by the ongoing capital campaign and our fundraising events.
