


Holy Week comes to an end at sunset of Great and Holy Saturday, as the Church prepares to celebrate her most ancient and preeminent festival, Pascha, the feast of feasts.

The time of preparation will give way to a time of fulfillment. The glorious and resplendent light emanating from the empty Tomb will dispel the darkness. Christ, risen from the dead, cracks the fortress of death and takes "captivity captive" (Psalm 67:19).

All the limitations of our createdness are torn asunder. Death is swallowed up in victory and life is liberated. "For as by a man came death, by a man came also the resurrection of the dead. For as in Adam all die, so also in Christ shall all be made alive" (I Corinthians 15:21-22).

Pascha is the dawn of the new and unending day. The Resurrection constitutes the most radical and decisive deliverance of humankind.

FATHER'S MESSAGE

THE PROMISE OF THE RESURRECTION

Beloved Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

This month, we will once again be gathering late on a Saturday evening to observe the most important feastday in the calendar of the Orthodox Christian Church: the holy and glorious Sunday of Pascha, when we celebrate the life-bestowing Resurrection of our Lord, God and Savior Jesus Christ! All the lights will be turned off, all the candles extinguished – except for one, the small oil lamp on the Altar table. It is pitch dark. This symbolizes the darkness of death – the bitter reality, the wise of this world tell us, which awaits all living creatures on this earth, including every human being that has ever lived or is currently alive, or who will be born in the future.

The great Italian poet Dante Alighiari, in his epic poem, *The Inferno*, described the grim words which he imagined would be posted above the cave mouth which he described as the entrance to Hell: "Abandon all hope, all ye who enter here." He meant this message to apply only to those who would be condemned to Hell for their evil deeds. In our secular time, however, Dante's words might as well apply to all of us. Indeed, the grim reality is that the modern world in its sophistication has more or less rejected the central message of the Christian Gospel—which is the promise of eternal life through faith in Jesus Christ, the One who conquered death by death. Instead, more and more people have embraced the belief that death is immediate and final for all human beings—just as it is for every other creature that has ever lived. Consequently, there is no room for hope, no place for the central message of the Gospel to take root in their souls.

The Orthodox Christian Church has always rejected such skepticism and has never strayed far from the conviction that the Good News of Christ's Resurrection is *the core* of the Gospel message. That is why we put such emphasis on the season of Holy Week and Pascha (Easter). We see it as a time for renewal of our faith in an increasingly cynical and dangerous world, of reading and hearing once again – or perhaps for the first time – the whole story of the last days of Jesus Christ on earth, and how they led, through the Cross, to His victory over death and his glorious Resurrection on the third day. It is this story which constitutes the heart of the Gospel and of our faith.

It is a moving story, which begins with the miraculous triumph over death which Jesus demon-strated in Bethany, when He called his beloved friend Lazarus (who had passed away four days earlier) to arise and come out of his tomb into the light of day, fully alive once again (Lazarus Saturday). This is followed by Jesus's triumphant entry into Jerusalem (Palm Sunday), where word had gotten out about what had happened in Bethany. But the people misunderstood. They welcomed Him as a king – a political leader – who would restore Israel and expel the Roman overlords. He was indeed a king. But, as He told Pontius Pilate, "My Kingdom is not of this world" (John 18:36, NKJV). He was not sent to assume earthly authority, but rather, to proclaim the Good News of salvation from sin and death and subsequent citizenship in God's eternal Kingdom, which He would accomplish through His sacrifice on the Cross and His Resurrection.

The evening services on Palm Sunday, Holy Monday, and Holy Tuesday, honor Jesus as the "Bridegroom" and the Church as His Bride. Our Lord, out of His infinite love for His wayward children – humanity – gave His own life, in order to save His Bride from sin and death. This metaphor has Old Testament antecedents (i.e., God and the children of Israel), and is used by the Lord in a number of places, but the primary reference here is to Jesus's parable in Matthew 25:1-13 of the 10 Virgins (5 foolish, and 5 wise) that Jesus told near the end of His earthly ministry. It is read during the Presanctified Liturgy of Holy Tuesday morning (rarely celebrated in parish churches), and we shall hear it when it is repeated during the Sacrament of Holy Unction on Holy Wednesday evening. It challenges us to "be ready" on a daily basis for that unknown moment when the Bridegroom (the Risen Lord) will return in glory to judge the living and the dead, and to usher into His eternal Kingdom those who are prepared. Each of the virgins has an oil lamp, which must be lit in order to welcome the Bridegroom when he arrives. However, five are foolish, and bring no extra bottle of oil with them, while the wise virgins are fully prepared. All keep their lamps lit for the entire evening, but only the wise virgins have a way to refill their lamps when they are about to go out. As a consequence, only the wise virgins are permitted to enter the bridal chamber.

The *Orthodox Study Bible* explains that the "This parable is primarily about the virtue of charity and almsgiving, as **oil** and **mercy** have the same root in Greek. The **wise virgins** are those who practice charity and mercy in this life, while the **foolish** are those who squander God's gifts on themselves." (See p. 1317)

FATHER'S MESSAGE, Con't

On Holy Wednesday evening and especially on Holy Thursday morning, we commemorate the **Last Supper**, which forms the basis for the institution of the sacrament of **Holy Communion** which is celebrated at every Divine Liturgy. We believe that our Lord really meant it, when He said to His disciples that the bread and wine which He blessed mystically becomes His Risen Body and Blood, through the Holy Spirit. We also profess that it was His will and commandment that we, as Christians and members of His Church (which St. Paul also called His Body) should do this in memory of Him on a regular basis. This is the most appropriate day of the year to receive Holy Communion, and I strongly encourage everyone who possibly can to do so, if their schedule allows.

On Holy Thursday evening, we commemorate by anticipation, with great solemnity and reverence, the trial and Crucifixion of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. The enormity of what occurred on the hill of Golgotha, and what our Lord had to suffer and endure in His humanity in order to save us from ourselves and our penchant for sin and death, is beyond our ability even to imagine. There is a good reason why we sing the "Se Imnoumen" hymn at every Divine Liturgy, while the celebrant fervently prays that God may send down His Holy Spirit and make the bread and wine His Body and Blood: "We praise You, we bless You, we give thanks to You, and we pray to You, Lord our God." While we may have much to be thankful for – each in our own personal way – nothing else even comes close to the gratitude that all of us owe our Creator and Savior – who created us in the beginning, and then, remade us into His Sons and daughters by grace through the death and resurrection of our Lord, the Son of God made flesh for this express purpose.

On Great and Holy Friday, we keep vigil with the Lord in His grave, as depicted in the *kouvouklion* (a stylized bier, decorated with beautiful flowers). But, even here, the power of the Resurrection is made manifest, as we believe that the Lord in His divinity descended to hell and broke the bonds of those held captive there, "trampling down death by death," even while His body was resting in the grave. Then, He brought them with Him out of Hell. Glory to God, for His divine condescension!

All is dark on Holy Saturday night, as midnight approaches in our Church. The bishop steps forward with his candle to light it from the vigil lamp on the altar table. He begins that ancient chant, which embodies all the hope and joy that the world can imagine, and more: "Come receive the light, from the light which knows no night, and glorify Christ, who is risen from the dead!" Soon, all the candles are lit, and the room is filled with light. The faithful spill out into the cold night air, in order to hear the Good News as it is symbolically proclaimed to the whole world by the Bishop, who reads Mark's account of the "young man" (an angel?) they find sitting in Christ's empty tomb: "Do not be alarmed. You seek Jesus of Nazareth, who was crucified? He is risen! He is not here. See the place where they laid Him!"

FATHER'S MESSAGE, Con't

Day after day, from Lazarus Saturday until now, every service, every hymn, and every scripture reading has been moving us towards this moment: "He is risen! He is not here." And then, the clergy and the people begin to sing that ancient anthem: "Christ is risen from the dead, trampling down death by death, and on those in the tombs bestowing life!"

In the light of the Resurrection, all things are made new, and hope is restored to humanity. We live in difficult times, with "wars, and rumors of wars" running rampant, as well as epidemics and domestic unrest. But, was it not always so? Indeed, we live as Christians in two worlds: in the everyday world with all its flaws and imperfections, and in the world to come in God's Kingdom, the promise of which is conveyed to us through the Gospel of Jesus Christ. All of us can become ambassadors for this Kingdom which is to come, this holy place where the Resurrection is a reality and evil has been banished. We do so, when we seek to become a loving presence to everyone around us, taking care of our neighbors in need, and visiting the ill or shut-ins in their loneliness. We do so, when we set the good example in our homes, by teaching our children how important it is to be thoughtful, kind and fair, and to build up, not tear down, those around us. God's Kingdom, you see, is not just to come. It has arrived, and we live within it, when we allow God's love to govern our hearts. Christ is Risen! Truly he is Risen!

YOUTH SAFETY WORKERS

Who is considered a Youth Safety Worker?

All Clergymen (Bishops/Priests/Deacons, both Active & Retired)
Pastoral Assistants & Youth Directors

People assisting, in any ministry, where the participants are under 18

years of age or in high school, whichever is later.

Including Parish Youth Safety Administrators, Church School Teachers, Dance Directors, Greek School Teachers, Youth Advisors (including Chaperones & Drivers) and Parish Council.

Even... Parents who occasionally help-out, but are alone with other people's children.

Each Youth Safety Worker is required to register yearly with the church.

Registration is available through the church office. In addition, all Youth Safety Workers are required to take two courses (on-line training platform) annually and to complete a background check every other year.

Here is the website: Please register at https://ncsrisk.org/goarch/. The first course, Youth Safety, has two parts. The second course, Youth Worker Regulations, has one part. Prompt completion is necessary as one cannot participate in any youth programs without being registered, having a background check, having PA state clearances, and completing the two courses.

METROPOLIS PHILOPTOCHOS HELPS RESIDENTS OF EAST PALESTINE, OHIO

On February 3rd, a train with 38 cars carrying hazardous materials derailed, caught fire and sent clouds of chemicals into the air and into the nearby waterways, including the Ohio River. Residents of the small town of East Palestine, Ohio, which is located about 20 miles south of Youngstown and 40 miles northwest of Pittsburgh, had to evacuate their homes, leave behind personal belongings and drink only bottled water.

The Metropolis Philoptochos Board voted to send \$1,000 from our Emergency Fund to an organization known as The Brightside Project in East Palestine that is providing support to families. As always, when Philoptochos sees suffering, we respond with assistance.


